

INTRODUCTION

Dear Colleagues,

Navigating the COVID-19 crisis has, in many ways, brought people closer together despite the necessity for physical distancing. As a society, we have quickly invented new ways of working and communicating, proving the resilience of the human spirit and our need for connection. We recognize these silver linings as we celebrate the 50th anniversary of Earth Day.

As Columbia's first campus-wide sustainability plan will come to a close in 2020, the Office of Environmental Stewardship has begun the planning process to build its next iteration of a 10-year plan encompassing all four of Columbia's campuses. The new plan will provide a roadmap for the University to take progressive, urgent action around climate change.

Plan 2030 will expand upon the first sustainability plan and include content in the following operational focus areas: Campus Energy; Transportation; Sustainable Construction and Design; Retail Tenant Alignment; Sustainable Events; and Water. Two new committees have also been created: an Earth Institute faculty committee to propose new ways for the Columbia campus to serve as a living lab, and a student committee to propose and lead strategies that integrate sustainability into campus culture.

This 2019-2020 Sustainable Columbia Mid-Year Update is a snapshot of the progress we have collectively made towards realizing the University's 2017-2020 goals. We have traditionally released a progress report in April to honor Earth Day, and this Mid-Year Update will serve that purpose this year. A complete progress report will be released early next year with updated statistics and accomplishments from 2020.
